Purpose: To encourage and equip the churches of NW Missouri and NE Kansas to let the

word of Christ dwell more richly among them by studying and practicing biblical

counseling together.

Summary: One of the youths in your church seems constantly gloomy, and he often jokes about killing himself. How do you reach out? One of the husbands in your church asks for accountability in his struggle with pornography. What do you do? Your long-time friend recently lost her husband, and you're concerned that she's begun drinking too much alcohol. What do you say to her? Mental health, habitual sins, addictions—can everyday church members and pastors help with these? While referring someone to a professional is often a wise suggestion, here's the reality: we are all always counseling one another. What we say can either build others up in God's truth or weaken them with human wisdom. Christians cannot choose whether we are counselors, but what we will counsel others with. This means it is a worthy goal for all Christians—and especially pastors—to train one another to be counselors of God's Word, to be biblical counselors. This workshop will seek to teach us some of the foundations of biblical counseling, and then provide some

Heat: This is the person's

Cross: This focuses on the



You and your wife enjoy a fairly good relationship with Jim and Cindy. You consider Jim a friend and Cindy and your wife occasionally get together at the coffee shop. As couples, you sat together at the marriage conference that your church promoted held at a nearby church last year.

What initiatives might you take as an Ephesians 4:13-16 believer to respond?

Now you're on the phone with Cindy. She relates these facts: Six weeks ago, she got up to take care of the baby and came down to the home office to check on him. When she opened the door, he reached up quickly and jerked the screen of his laptop closed. She gave him a surprised look and he awkwardly told her that he had just finished for the night. Now suspicious, she began to check his laptop. Several dozen pornographic pictures turned up. When she told him, he became angry at her for getting into his stuff. She insisted that he get help or else she would talk with someone at church. He reacted by withdrawing and devoting even more time to the project. She's hoping you'll do something.
